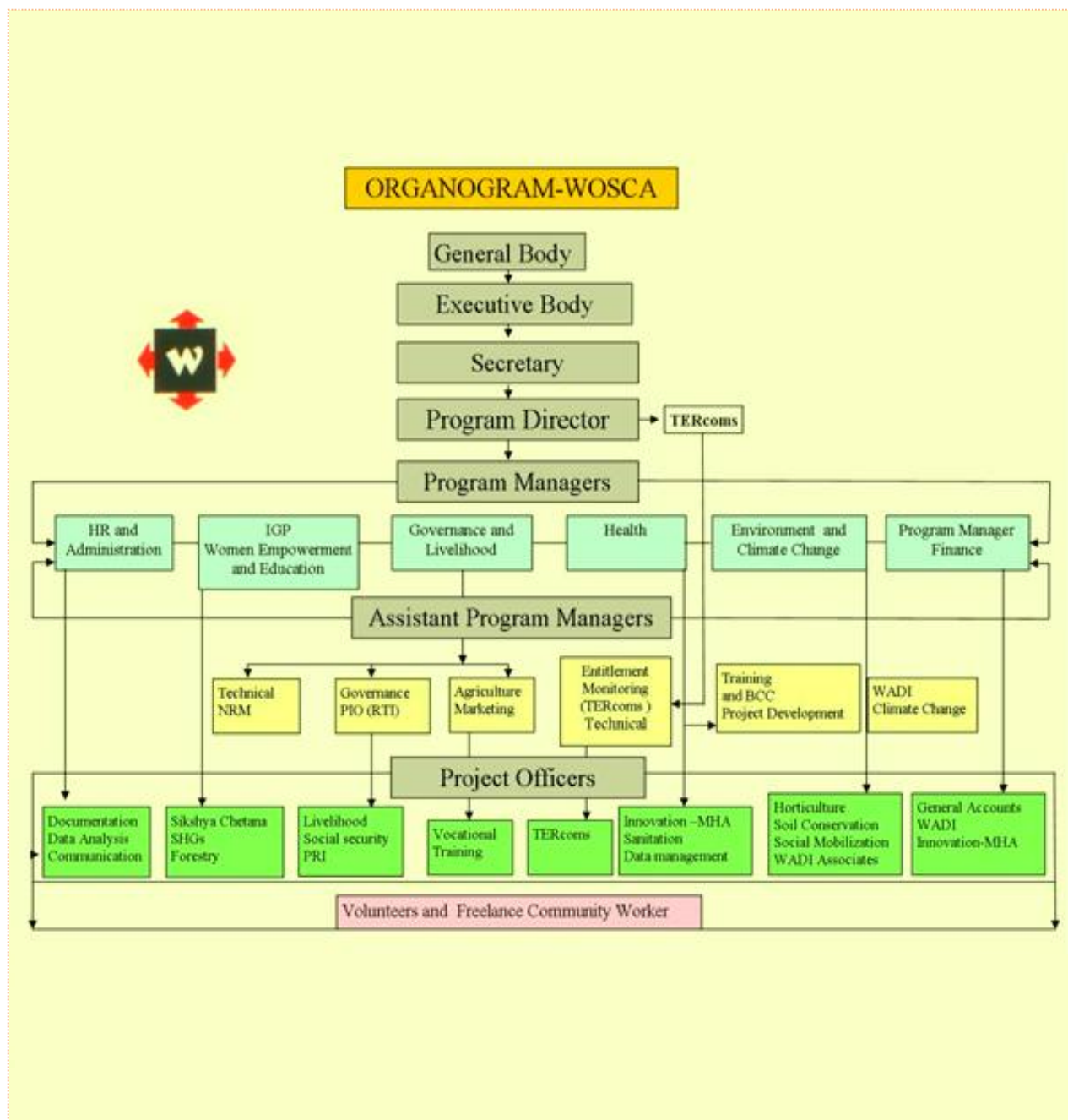

ANNUAL REPORT

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GOVERNANCE & LIVELIHOOD

OTELP Plus

Orissa Tribal Empowerment and Livelihood Program



OTELP-Plus project is launched by the Integrated Tribal Development Agency, Keonjhar through WOSCA as the PNGO, and implemented in 23 Tribal villages of Harichandanpur Block covering 3636 households. The major objective of the project is to ensure that the livelihoods and food security of poor tribal households are sustainably improved through promoting a more efficient, equitable, self-managed and sustainable utilisation of the natural resources at their disposal and through off-farm/non-farm enterprise development. With a view to facilitate the community mobilisation and institution building in the 2nd year of implementation, Village Development

Associations and Village Development Committees were formed and registered under the Society registration Act in 23 villages. Furthermore Bank accounts were opened and capacitated through training and exposure visits. 52 trainings and 12 exposure visits were organised on different components. Through participatory approach, 26 community need based projects have been identified and implemented by the community itself. With the process of community capacity building, we are concentrating on educating the community about their resources and how to manage and use them in a sustainable way. Simultaneously, scope for self employment are being created by providing different trainings like driving, nursing, Fishery, Improved cooking wood stove, Preparation of Agarbati etc.

PACS-Livelihood Programme

Poorest Area Civil Society Programme

In its fourth year of implementation, Poorest Area Civil Society (PACS)-Livelihood Programme has provided benefit to 84547 persons in 16 GPs of Jhumpura and Patna block. A total of 198 applications for agricultural land have been forwarded, 124 applications have been verified and in 133 cases, patta distribution (distribution of land entitlements) has taken place.

Workshop on land rights

The workshop was supported by Institute of Social Sciences (ISS), Bhubaneswar and facilitated by the Secretary of WOSCA. There were 33 participants from different blocks of Keonjhar district. In the workshop, different land related issues were discussed and an action plan was drafted. Good co-ordination between the government and voluntary organisations for the successive of Forest Right Act was pursued in the workshop.

Alliance building meeting on FRA

The alliance building meeting was conducted among the 50 participants of three blocks of Keonjhar district. The land related schemes provided to FRA beneficiaries were shared and the issues of villagers were discussed to present to the govt.



In the meeting, it was finalized that the line departments will work together for the implementation of CFR at community level.

Women Convention

Under this project, one district level Women convention was organized at hotel Sagar, Keonjhar where valuable information were forwarded by the dignitaries related on agriculture, NRHM, ICDS, consumer protection, MISSION SAKTI and constitutional law and legislation for women. Awareness on government plans and programmes among the women participants was generated.

Orientation to Government officers

Specific issues on FRA in the Keonjhar district were discussed. Capacity of the Government Officials was built up on CFR process and the mapping system of CFR.



TERcoms

Tracking livelihood entitlement of rural communities using digital platform



With the objective to improve social protection service delivery mechanism and supply chain at panchayat level by strengthening demand side, WOSCA has been facilitating the Tracking Entitlement

Project in Ghatagaon, Harichandanpur, Telkoi and Banspal block of Keonjhar district. This project, supported by Digital Empowerment Foundation (DEF) has the coverage of 20000 families. Initially the problems of the poor in the operational areas were lack of awareness regarding the schemes and programmes implemented by the government to bring about significant changes in the lives and livelihood of these people. Followed to the tracking of the social security schemes namely Pensions, PDS and MGNREGS livelihood security has been retained in the areas.

Strengthening governance through PRI capacity building

The main objective of the Capacity building programme of PRIs is to improve the grass root democracy by giving appropriate training to the elected representatives on roles and responsibilities to deliver better services to people. This project was implemented in 16 villages of two Gram Panchayats of Patna block and included 16800 persons. During this year, different village level issues were raised and different actions were taken to solve the same at various levels. The project is being supported by



the Centre for World Solidarity (CWS).

Achievements

- 29 Block level women forum members oriented on child rights, CWC, JJ acts and Hindu Marriage Act, Domestic Violence Act.
- 109 villagers participated in a Public hearing programme on FRA.
- 38 participants oriented on Intensive Participatory Planning and Exercise (IPPE) for better implementation of MGNREGA.
- The block level PR forum members oriented on Community Forest Right under FRA
- 41 members of District level women forum capacitated on women health issue and women rights. The forum members also met the collector for smooth implementation of RSBY and BKKY in each block and timely and regular opening of ultra sound department in District Headquarter from 10am - 6pm.

Cluster Facilitation Program on Convergence of MGNREGA and NRLM

Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGS) of Govt. of India, supported by Ministry of Rural Development has proved its effectiveness in the past year. This year WOSCA has started implementing the Cluster Facilitation Programme on convergence of MGNREGA and NRLM in 25 GPs of Harichandanpur block. Under this project, 13400 people were made aware on MGNREGA. 39 Labour Groups have been formed and eight Rozgar diwas have been facilitated in three GPs.

Under this programme, Capacity building initiative is going on, for example 73 PRI members were trained on Participatory Planning in 13 GPs.

Furthermore, we converged the funds provision under MGNREGA for the poor people by making appropriate land development plans for them. So far out of the 4325 HHs demanded job and 1,09,042 Person Days generated out of which 35,159 is by women workers. 84 HHs completed 100 days of work. WOSCA facilitates the work demand from people under MGNREGA and ensures the project is completed with the involvement of job seekers.

Maa Tarini Child Learning Center

Maa Tarini Child Learning Center was opened on 3rd March 2015 at the Rural Training Center, Gopalpur. There are four computers provided for the children and computer education is offered there in free of cost. Furthermore, special English learning courses are also planned for junior students free of cost. The classes are conducted from Friday to Sunday. A total of 20 students have been admitted in the year 2014-15. The learning materials for the center are supported by Vodafone Foundation (India). We turned the valuable circumstances into a valuable

opportunity with a strategy for the center that includes technology support, updates of instruction and a learning system as part of report to ensure that the operation of the program is sustainable.



AMA DEOJHAR PROJECT

Effective Facilitation of Govt. Scheme to Ensure Social Security Safety Net



Ama Deojhar Project was implemented in seven villages of Deojhar GP, Joda Block of Keonjhar District under PPP mode. It was supported by Jindal Steel and Power Ltd. During this year significant benefits have been marked through ensuring efficient management of government's social security schemes and smooth running of community protective schemes. In this year, 1071 community members including SHGs and 43 duty bearers made aware on government schemes. A substantial increase in number of job card holders has been noticed. 257 pregnant women have opened Bank Accounts and 155 pregnant women have

been provided necessary support for the scheme. 25 persons have applied for SWABALAMBAN out of those 22 have received the card which will help them to bridge the financial gaps at the old age. 19 persons have filled up the forms of Micro Pension. Most of the persons among them are women. 566 persons have enrolled under RSBY schemes. WOSCA has been successful to cover 364 farmer families under BKKY. Total 282 applications have been submitted for Labour card. Again, 25 acres of degraded land have been identified for WADI (Orchard) development.



Promotion and Credit Linkage of 50 WSHGS

WOSCA has focused its attention on the socio-economic empowerment of the women to show them the way for viable community based resources management. In this process 50 WSHGs were formed and strengthened in Ghatagaon block in the previous years with the support of NABARD. Out of the

total 33 WSHGs were credit linked during this year and a series of awareness and orientation programmes on group initiatives to strengthen socio-economic base at the village level were taken up to mobilize the women community.

WADI

Horticulture and agriculture based community development program

WADI Ghatagaon

Supported by NABARD, 955.45 acres of wasteland at Ghatagaon have been transformed in to productive land since 2009 covering 1286 tribal families. In its sixth year of implementation much more things have been achieved from the WADI Project.

- 1000 chick birds provided to 100 vulnerable persons for livestock building.
- Ten trainings organized for Udyan Vikash Samiti (UVS) on WADI dynamics, plant care and management.
- 50 Vermin compost prepared at Ankalapada village.
- Three trainings on Micro-Entrepreneurship conducted for 121 villagers.
- Three public health camps organized for 765 community members.
- 40 UVS members were provided exposure to Harsha Trust, Koraput on Best Practices of WADI.



PVTG-WADI

With the support of NABARD, 602.34 acres of wasteland were transformed at Banspal including its 2nd year of implementation. 722 persons could benefit from these activities.

- 27 UVS were formed and strengthened constituting 450 WADI holders.
- 11 open well dug at Mamlaposi, Bayakumutia, Talachampe and Tangarapada village
- 11 Chain washer pumps installed
- 50 Poly Tubes provided to the beneficiaries
- 25 Vermin-pit prepared at Ghungi and Kundhei village
- 100 smokeless Chulla provided to 100 families of Ghungi, Kundhei and Toranipani village.
- 5 HP Pumpset supplied to 38 beneficiaries for irrigation to WADI Plants.
- 8 Skill Development training conducted for farmers.
- 5 UVS Trainings conducted on WADI Management, Post plantation care, Producers Co-operatives, etc.
- Exposure on WADI management provided to 200 Farmers to Balabhadrapur and Jharbeda.

- One Capacity Building training for SHG Leaders on dynamics of SHG, Credit management and savings with IG activities..
- Two experience sharing workshops for WADI farmers held.
- Six Health Camps conducted for 1338 community members.
- One PIA staff training held on WADI management, Fertilizer application, nurturing and care of Plants, Mid-term plant care and management.

ITDA-WADI

Supported by ITDA, Keonjhar, 355 acres of wasteland at Harichandanpur & Ghatagaon was developed in to productive land since last three years. The focus of intervention is to provide orchard-based livelihood support to the tribal families and to ensure their participation in WADI development. During this year the following activities were undertaken to promote the WADI at Baijapada, Muktapur, Ramchandrapur, Baxibarigaon and Ostapanga villages.

- 14 no. of open Well dug.
- 14 Chain washer pump provided to the farmers.
- 30 Poly Tube supplied to the WADI beneficiaries.



FADP-WADI

The Focus Area Development Programme (**FADP**) under the Department of ST & SC Development, Govt. of Odisha was taken up in Champua & Jhumpura block supported by ITDA, Champua. Followed to the village level awareness meeting on WADI, 330 families from ten villages of Champua block were identified as beneficiaries of FADP-WADI having 267.33 acres of wasteland.

In this WADI, 5290 Mango, 6207 Cashew and 8333 lemon grafts were planted during this year. 20 UVS were formed consisting of 280 farmers of the operational villages. As a support towards continuation of WADI, fertilizer namely, Annapurna, Cholopiraphus dust and Bonemill was provided to the beneficiaries in free of cost. Orientation to the WADI holders was taken up in a regular basis.



HEALTH & EDUCATION

Shakti Varta

Community Managed Women & Children Health Development

Shakti Varta project was implemented in Keonjhar district supported by IPE-Global Pvt. Ltd. The project is covering all 13 blocks except municipalities, 287 Gram Panchayats, 2067 villages and a population of 15,48,674 as well as 11,897 Self Help Groups (SHGs). Under this project, 54 cluster review points have been identified in the district for the smooth monitoring, reporting and tracking of the programme. As an important activity, assessment of Block level SHG

federation has been completed and through the assessment, the strengths and gaps of the BLF have been identified. ICDS and BLF have nominated their Block Coordinator-Cum-Master Trainers to improve involvement and support the timely decisions taken as well as quality feedback to the stakeholders. 574 GP facilitators have been nominated by the GP and Block SHG federation to directly implement the programme in the community through meeting process.

Blood Donation Camp

As one of its regular activities, WOSCA has organized a Blood Donation Camp on the eve of Republic Day at District Blood Bank of Keonjhar. The camp was inaugurated by the BBO. A total of 26 unit of blood was collected in the camp. The staff, volunteers and community organizers voluntarily donated blood for the noble cause. The Camp was started at 10.00 a.m. and went up to till 3:00 pm. Awareness Most of the staff members and

volunteers of the organisation participated voluntarily in the camp. The camp was conducted for the whole day and the camp was facilitated by the staff of District Blood Bank and District Red Cross Society, Keonjhar branch and members of senior citizens. Many Check ups for blood pressure and other tests were also conducted by the doctors. Refreshments were provided to the participants after donating blood.

WOSCA - NRHM - Maa Gruha

As per the guideline of the NRHM, Maternity Waiting Home (MWH) at Harichandanpur is functioning to provide the maternal health care to the pregnant and lactating mothers before the expected date of delivery. In this year, 356 mothers have been admitted out of which 33 from PTG. A total of 331 deliveries have been done through MWH. For the inmates of MWH, two times nutritious food, free of cost as well as recreational facilities have

been provided during their stay at MWH. 72 counseling sessions have been conducted to raise the inmates' awareness on MNCH care. Total of 116 village level awareness sessions have been conducted at the outreach villages to disseminate the messages on MNCH services and to promote awareness among community on the facilities available at MWH.

Child Marriage Prevention and Education

The Child Marriage Prevention – India (CMPI) Project supported by Development Focus through Old Rourkela Education Society (ORES) aims to strengthen the knowledge of school going children on life skill education, SRHR knowledge, bad consequences of child marriages and legal provision of child marriage, etc. using school level sensitization programmes.

During this year, 120 local cadres (Yuba Mitra) were developed in each 20 villages and 40 youth groups were formed and strengthened on SRHR knowledge. Through community sensitization initiatives, 600 SHG members and 120 PRI members were sensitized to stop child marriage. Adding to this, 55 teachers were also oriented on life skill education, SRHR knowledge and transaction of positive discipline at the school level to impart it to



the school children. Under this programme mass awareness was also generated through video shows and the distribution of leaflet to the community to highlight the issues of early child marriage. As a result, six child marriages could be postponed by the village level Yuba Mitra through counseling to the parents and children during this year.

Consumer Counseling and Education



An awareness Workshop on Consumer Rights and Consumer Protection Act was organised by the Consumer Counseling Centre, functioning in the premises of DCDRF, Keonjhar at Dhanabeni Village of Harichandanpur block. The awareness workshop was attended by the President,

DCDRF, Lady Member, DCDRF, Secretary-WOSCA and 63 villagers of Dhanbeni village. In this workshop, the role of the Consumer Counseling Center was explained, especially stress was put that there are no legal formalities for filing a complaint. One can attach the supporting documents, that is, guarantee or warrantee card and cash memo with the complaint and submit it at the consumer counseling centre. There is no need to go to any lawyer or professional for legal assistance. You yourself can plead the case at the centre. All the guests put stress that a lot more has to be done in the area of creating awareness on the part of the consumer to facilitate suitable remedy wherever there is a need.

Financial Literacy Programme

In February 2015 WOSCA organized an awareness programme on financial literacy at Mudrabeda High School, Ghatagaon with the active support of NABARD. The objective of this programme was to facilitate financial inclusion through imparting knowledge to enable financial planning and improve the understanding of financial products. Through this programme teachers learned how the financial inclusion could be executed and carried out in a more planned and systematic way. This awareness programme was very useful for Teachers and Students. It was helped them in clarifying a number of their doubts and

questions. It also broke a number of myths (that the students had) including the major one that the Savings is designed for the high class people. The programme was for 50 school students Of Mudrabeda High School of Ghatagaon block.



District Level Essay Writing Competition for School & College Students



A district level Essay writing competition was organized on the subject of Consumer movement among the School and College students of the Keonjhar District on 22nd February 2015. The contest was organized at Town Girls High School, Keonjhar in coordination with the Addl. District Magistrate, C.S.O, ACLM, President, District Consumer Forum at the district level and Supported by Food Supplies & Consumer Welfare Department, Govt. of Odisha.

In the competition, Girls were very active and all the winners were girls. They

Crèche

Child Development and Education

WOSCA is running a day Care cum Crèche centre at Nischntpur village of Sadar block with the active support of State Social Welfare Board under Dept. of Women & Child Development. As the scheme is Rajiv Gandhi National Crèche Programme, their concern is the Child Welfare for babies of working women of nearby areas. The main objective of running the Crèche centre is to provide complete care, immunization, health care

and education to 25 children. They can play games, gain knowledge of alphabets and receive food supplements, etc. They are provided with cooked *Rice, Moong Dal, Suji, Chuda* etc. The health check up of the children is regularly taken up in the centre in every month. The Crèche centre is providing school preparedness programs to the children and focused on the all round development and health care of these children.



CHILD RIGHTS & WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

Child Centered Community Development Programme (CCCD)

With the support of Plan India, WOSCA has been implementing Child Centered Community Development Project in 43 villages of Ghatagaon block since 2012.

Total 88 sponsored families have been covered in different programs during FY 15 and the total outreach of the programme covered is 30,118 persons of the project area.

Children have right to Protection

- Child protection committees (CPC) identified nine child abuse cases.
- 17 child marriages either stopped and delayed
- 27 children got their Birth certificate.
- Detail audits conducted in residential schools on child abuse
- Hand Book published on Acts and rules related to child protection.
- 303 children, stakeholders and community members trained on child protection and following the cases in the villages.
- 110 teachers made aware on child rights and RTE and 40 CPC members on JJ Act.

Promoting Quality Education for children in Tribal Areas.

- 25 school drop-out children re-enrolled.
- Four children from most marginalized families admitted to Ashram school.
- 830 persons trained on Nutrition and Child Care.

- 32 PU staff trained on growth monitoring and developmental milestones.
- 46 AWW and selected staff trained on use of TLM and school readiness.

Enabling children to take part in the development processes

- Nine child club federations strengthened and local issues discussed with government officials.
- Child club members in nine villages monitoring the services in Anganwadi Center.
- 49 children recognized the inherent talents of each other in a creative workshop.
- 7400 children and adults put their signature against barbaric killing of children by Taliban in Pakistan and those signatures were sent to UN.



Optimal Health

- 22 malnourished children identified and sent to Nutrition rehabilitation center where their status could be improved.
- Wall calendar depicting messages on complementary feeding supplied to 251 AWCs of Ghatagaon block.
- People in 18 villages gained access to safe drinking water.
- 50 ASHAs trained on benefits of safe institutional delivery, child care, immunization and IYCF
- 25 members of ARAMVA & WOSCA trained on MCH.
- 108 women trained on home based care of children and hygiene issues while feeding the child.
- 1500 pictorial hand books on age appropriate complimentary feeding and appropriate nutrition food intake during pregnancy given to service providers.
- 843 people residing in inaccessible areas got health check-up benefits
- RCH mela cum counselling sessions covered 322 adolescent girls. 26 girls trained as peer trainer for menstrual hygiene.
- 217 male members trained on birth spacing and family planning.
- 400 mosquito nets distributed to sponsored families.



Livelihood Promotion

- 23 new SHGs formed, 12 SHGs linked with Bank for income generation activities.
- 58 SHGs received Rs.10,000/- each as revolving fund from ICDS and out of them 22 SHGs started their own business.
- 1566 SC families informed on Kissan Credit card. 74 families applied for the same out of which 18 received the cards so far.
- 1000 SC families received seeds and started a kitchen nutrition garden.
- 10 nos. Of Natural Resource Management plans under MGNREGA approved for Rs.61 Lakhs which would improve agricultural land of 530 families and also fetch 35000 working days to them under MGNREGA during FY 16.
- 225 girls and 172 boys completed carrier counselling for vocational training. 177 youth got vocational trainings in five trades. Out of them 58 started their own enterprises, and 59 got employment
- 49 poor families facilitated with rural housing
- Nine widow and 21 old aged pensions facilitated.
- 442 women trained on livestock care and 54 women exposed to poultry firms for setting up business. This was done followed to the OLM/NRLM convergence meeting which took place with 325 SHG members.



ENVIRONMENT CONSERVATION

CDM- Smokeless Chulla



This project was started in the month of March 2014 with the knowledge and guidance of Lead NGO-YCDA, Boudh and supported by Development Focus. In the initial phase, Village meetings were organized to promote Smokeless Chulla in rural areas of Keonjhar district and ten trainees were selected for the first batch training and another ten trainees for the second batch training.

For development of a cadre of professionals, Five days long residential

training was imparted to the selected participants at Rural training Centre, Gopalpur, Keonjhar.

In the training, topics on the process of preparing the smokeless Chulla and its benefits were covered. Trainees were also capacitated on the soft skill of Entrepreneurship Development. This Project was completed in the month of Feb-2015.

BENEFITS:

- *Appropriate and low cost technology*
- *Less fire wood and less time used for cooking*
- *No smoke in kitchen room and thus less smoke borne diseases*

LIVILHOOD ENHANCING POTENTIAL:

Now it will be the supplementary income for the families as they are getting skill wages.

Facilitation of Integrated Watershed Management Programme (IWMP-V)

The Integrated Watershed Management Programme was launched under the IWMP-Batch-V for the year 2013-14 in the month of November 2014 in 19 villages of Anandapur block with the support of the Department of Soil Conservation. As the PIA of IWMP-XV, WOSCA has initiated the Integrated Watershed Management Programme (IWMP-XV) in 5643 ha. Treatable area of Anandapur block since November 2014.



During the IWMP-XV programme village level awareness meetings have been conducted in 19 villages.

Under the entry point activity (EPA) a number of developmental activities like Changing Room / Bathing Room, Pond renovation, Road connectivity, Repairing of club house, Drying yard, Renovation of well with platform, etc have been taken up towards infrastructure development of the villages. For the betterment of the community public health camp, sensitization meeting, awareness programme on Govt schemes, vaccination camp and career counseling sessions have been conducted along with other activities of the IWMP project.

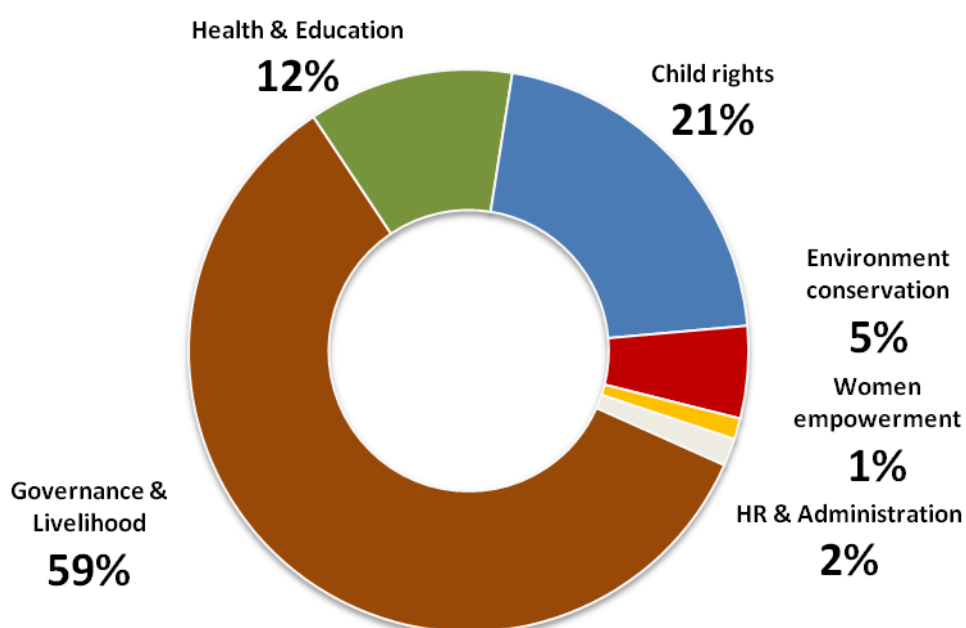

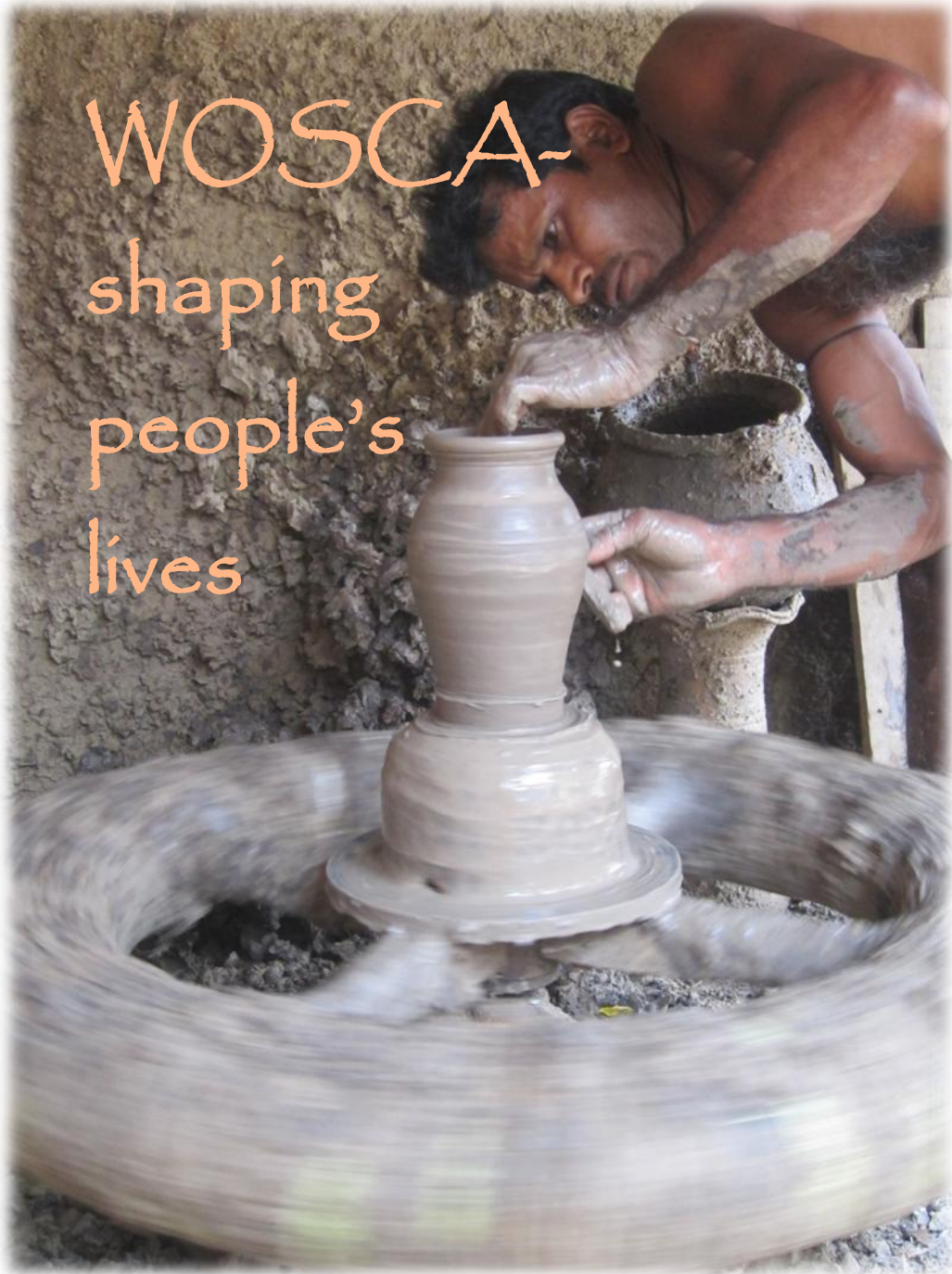
